Students were placed in groups in the week leading up to the day, to design, budget, measure and construct water bottle rockets that would be launched at the event.

As well as presenting and launching their water rockets, students also had a great time and lots of fun constructing paper rockets to compete for longest distance. The winning rocket reached a whooping 94 metres.

Results are still to be finalised but the current highest altitude reached is 82 metres – a massive effort!



Dear Parents,

There has been an outbreak of head lice at the school, and your child may have contracted the condition. We are asking that all parents examine their child's hair for signs of lice infestation. The lice themselves are often hard to find because they move around on the head. Therefore, you should be looking for the eggs or nits. These appear as tiny silvery white specks attached to the hair shaft near the scalp. Dandruff and hairspray may look similar but these are easily brushed away, the eggs are not. Other signs of lice infestation may be a red rash and scratch marks on the scalp, nape of the neck or behind the ears.

If you child has contracted head lice do not be alarmed. Although the condition is unpleasant, it is easily treated with a specialised treatment, which is available from your local store. After using the treatment (according to the directions on the pack), use a fine tooth comb to remove the dead lice and eggs. Or apply conditioner to dry hair and keep combing for at least 20 minutes (this is a very successful treatment). Any articles which may harbour lice such as clothes, towels and bed linen, should be washed in hot water and detergent. Combs and brushes should also be washed in hot soapy water. As head lice are highly contagious it is suggested that you examine and treat all members of the family at the same time. Also to minimise the risk it would be advisable for long hair to be tied back securely.

CHRISTMAS TREE FACTS

The first person to decorate a Christmas tree with lights was reportedly the Protestant reformer Martin Luther (1483-1546). According to legend, he was so moved by the beauty of the stars shining between the branches of a fir tree, he brought home an evergreen tree and decorated it with candles to share the image with his children.

The earliest known Christmas tree decorations were apples. At Christmastime, medieval actors would use apples to decorate paradise trees (usually fir trees) during "Paradise Plays," which were plays depicting Adam and Eve's creation and fall.

The Germans made the first artificial Christmas trees out of dyed goose feathers.
